Clouding of sensorium	The human sensory apparatus and related mental faculties considered as a whole. The state of the sensorium is tested through the traditional mental status examination; the sensorium may be clear (i.e., functioning normally) or clouded (lacking ability to concentrate and think clearly).	https://dictionary.apa.org/sensorium

Anatabuse (Disulfiram)	Blocks an enzyme that is involved in processing alcohol, producing very unpleasant side effects (such as fast heartbeat, chest pain, nausea, dizziness, flushing, and thirst) when combined with alcohol in the body.	https://www.drugs.com/antabuse.html
Buprenorphine	Narcotic/partial opioid agonist; used in medication-assisted treatment (MAT) to treat Opioid Use Disorder (OUD); is the first medication to treat opioid dependency that is permitted to be prescribed or dispensed in physician office.	https://www.samhsa.gov/medication-assisted-treatment/treatment/buprenorphine
Suboxone	contains a combination of buprenorphine and naloxone	https://www.drugs.com/suboxone.html
